We will also cover fruit, twigs, branching patterns, and other characteristics to aid in species identification. Growing Orchids – Naturally!

In their natural habitats, most common household orchids grow on trees or rocks with no soil around their roots; the pots that you buy them in are there to make it convenient for you to transport and display them. This class with award-winning orchid grower and author Barbara Schmidt will show you how to free your orchid from the confines of its pot and take it back to its natural state. The first half of the class will show you the fascinating adaptations orchids have that allow them to grow without soil. The second half will be a hands-on workshop where you'll learn how to mount an orchid on a piece of cork bark. You'll be able to take your "natural" orchid home and proudly hang it for display. After the class, Barbara will sign copies of her book, *Orchid Care: For the Beginner*, which will be available for purchase in our gift shop. ***Pre-registration is required.***

Lisa Narloch's recent work includes a variety of local woods from her own property and around Central New York. She is very careful to determine the state of each tree before it is gifted to her. Most of them have storm, rot or ant damage, and are already down. Some trees needed to be removed to expand a road, or were too close to buildings. She also uses 100% food grade hemp or walnut oils and beeswax (a gift from a local beekeeper) for natural finishes for the majority of her work. She has recently created some pieces from scrap wood she received from the arborists here at Cornell Botanic Gardens, which will be on display.
